


- 7 Rob Biddulph decided to put foxes in a story because a family of foxes visit his garden. If you were going to make a story about an animal, which animal would you choose and why?




- 1 The girls loved going to school because they enjoyed the journey. What do you enjoy about school the most? What is the most exciting part of your journey?



TIME TO TALK


- 1 Look at the 5 giants at the beginning of the book. Which one do you like the most and why? Which one do you think looks the scariest?

TIME TO TALK



TIME TO TALK

- At the start and end of the story we find out about some of Otto's favourite things. What things do you love? How did your favourite things become so special to you?

- Otto's basket is so lovely that everybody wants to share it. If you were making a nice space to rest in, how would you make it cosy and welcoming?


